Harry J Hedger MBE	1905	NSW Australian Football Association	Player/Official	Started his football career with the Williamstown Juniors in 1873. In 1886 he played for Nth Melbourne, at the time being the youngest senior footballer in Melbourne. In 1878 Harry came to Sydney and played Rugby for the Waratah Club. Upon the introduction of AFL he switched codes and in 1880 was chosen to represent NSW against VIC. In 1887 he vice captained the NSW team against the Victorians. In addition he represented NSW against S.A, QLD, TAS, where he was Captain, and New Zealand (Maoris). Some of his Achievements were Winning award at Sydney Club for Excellent Play, Best All Rounder, and Club best, Best all rounder at City Club (twice), and East Sydney Best all rounder (four times), as well as the Horden's Trophy for Flanagan Cup. Harry was instrumental in arranging for Fitzroy and Collingwood to play a competition match in Sydney in 1903. He played for the YMCA at age 45 in an effort to "make up numbers", and still managed to "put up a good game" He played for Sydney - 1881-84, City 1885 - 87, East Sydney 1888 -90 & 1893-94, West Sydney 1891 - 92 and YMCA 1903 -04. He represented NSW on 13 Occasions and Sydney twice.

Jim Phelan	1924	Australian National Football Council	Player/Official	<p>Jim Phelan gave 47 years of service to the game most of them in Sydney. A Victorian by birth, Jim learnt his football around Ballarat and moved to Sydney in the 1880's, where he played for the waratah Club, and then West Sydney Club, until the games' demise following the 1894 season. When the code was resurrected in Sydney 10 years later he became the inaugural treasurer then secretary of the Newtown Club until the outbreak of WWI. It was during this time that Jim wrote on a casual basis for one of the many Sydney Sporting Publications, the Arrow which was published weekly. But for Jim the game would have ceased in Sydney in 1915, due to an ambitious ground purchase and development, when he took up the secretaryship of the League. He was one of 6 who assumed responsibility to keep the game going in Sydney and as a league secretary proved a very capable administrator. He remained in this position until 1925, but by that time the game was well back on its feet. He was bestowed life membership of the ANFC in 1924 as a consequence of his long term affiliation as a state delegate for NSW after the end of WWI. He was also made a life member of both NSWFL and the Newtown FC. He later became an alderman on the Erskineville Municipal Council, where he is seen as mainly responsible for Australian football's long tenure (almost 100 years) with Erskineville Oval. When the Oval was rebuilt in a slightly different location so as to provide public housing during the late 1930's, it was almost solely through his efforts. He consulted on and monitored it's construction as a ground dedicated to AFL. He never gave up his affiliation with the game, and was still attending matches in the season preceding his death, writing for various publications and was present at several meetings of the league, before his passing in 1939 aged 79. The First grade best and fairest medal in Sydney was re titled to bear his name during the 1930's.</p>

Rupert P Browne	1932	NSW Australian Football Association	Official	Rupert Browne was a school teacher in Sydney. He did not have a background in Australian Football. He started teaching in 1903 and by about 1911 or so was transferred to the Gardeners Road School, Mascot (or Rosebery). The school catered for primary and also became a technical high school. He remained there as a teacher and sports master until 1951. He encouraged and supported Australian Football being played in the school and from 1916 was either manager, coach or selector of NSW Schools State and Sydney representative teams that played all over Australia during his time. He was secretary of the Public Schools Amateur Athletics Assn and also became involved with the NSW Football League of which he was a vice president over a number of years. He was president of the South Sydney Football Club for at least two years and also president of the South Sydney Junior Football Assn when it operated from about 1933-38. He was made a life member of the NSW AFL in 1935. Following his death, ex students of his school erected memorial gates at the school on the corner of Botany and Gardeners Road, which carry his name. He nurtured many players into our game who went on to play senior football for different clubs, many of whom represented the state.

Secretary of the Melbourne District Junior Football Association, disbanded on account of WWI, visited Sydney. He moved there soon after and began umpiring in 1919. He was also involved as, NSW AFL Vice President 1935 -44, Umpires Appointment Board 1930 - 42, 56, NSW State selector 1936 - 43, 47 -48 & 58, NSW State team manager 1946, Football Record Editor 1939, 40,43, Finance Committee 1935 -37, 43, 44, 48, 50, 51, 55, Permit & match C-committee 1936 -38,42 -44 & 59, Tribunal 1938 &55, Central Umpire 1919-29, Schools & Juniors - 1956 -57, ANFC NSW Advisory Board 1958 -60, Life member 1940, and with the NSW Aust Football Association - Founder & Secretary - Treasurer 1920 -29, Life member 1929
Ken G Ferguson	1941	NSW Australian Football Association	Official	After a couple of years of playing junior football for the Rosebery FC in the then Metropolitan Football Assn. (Second Div), he then landed a publicity job with the South Sydney Club. His ability and Zeal was noticed by the NSW AFL League officials and after 3 seasons with Sth Sydney he was persuaded to stand for office on the League. He was elected as assistant Secretary in 1934, and then secretary in 1936, a position which he held until 1959 (25 years). After he retired from work with the Railways he was appointed the vacant fulltime position of League secretary 1967-69. He managed State sides, negotiated on behalf of the league,

				travelled interstate, representing NSW at meetings, and for a long time was the heart and soul of football in Sydney. Ken was elected life member of the League in 1941. In 1955 he was awarded ANFC (now AFL) Merit Award for his services to the game. he has twice had premiership trophies named after him, in the early 1950's it was the K.G. Ferguson Shield for reserve grade premiers, and in the late 1980's the first grade trophy was named in his honour. Sadly both of these awards have faded from the awards presented within the league. In 1970 when he finally retired from his administration positions a testimonial dinner was held in his honour.

William (Bill) H Hart BEM (dcd)	1964	NSW Australian Football Association	Player/Official	Born in Sydney in 1926, he first signed on with the St George Club in 1946 /47 after playing AFL while in the force during WWII. He moved club upon the establishment of the Western Suburbs Club in 1948, and joined their committee as secretary in 1954, a position he held until 1965. During this time he was a prime mover in the establishment of the Western Suburbs Licenced Club and later as a board member of the NSW AFL arranged funding of the league to assist in the purchase of its own premises at 64 Regent St. Chippendale. He became President of the league in 1966, helping to reignite the organisation with football in the Riverina whilst at the same time gave Tacit encouragement to new leagues which were forming in non -Australian football areas in the state. In the late 1970's when the VFL was attempting to gain support for games to be played in Sydney and telecast Australia wide, he was not a great supporter as he saw this as local football having to take a second place in the system. As a result he was unceremoniously voted out of the League presidents' position in a well orchestrated campaign to oust him in Dec 1978. In the same year he received the Order of the British Empire for his services to sport. He continued his involvement with the western Suburbs Licenced Club and was elected into the Presidents' position for a number of years. Bill had a Sydney competition Best and Fairest medal names after him.

Roy J Hayes	1966	NSW Australian Football Association		Played 1943-64. Came to Sydney during World War II from Perth and played more than 300 games with Eastern Suburbs over 20 years, including 22 games for NSW. He is wildly recognised as one of the best players in Sydney in the 1950s. Hayes also coached Easts' senior team, passing on his knowledge and skills to hundreds of junior players. Roy was the engine room of the Eastern Suburbs' premiership teams of 1953-59. Roy was Mr Eastern Suburbs.
Jack Armstrong	1967	NSW Australian Football Association		Moved to Sydney after World War II. Played in excess of 300 senior matches. South Sydney (45-50), Newtown (50-55, 60), Liverpool (56-59). Took up umpiring aged 37 for five years (61-65), including umpires coach in (64-65). Returned to South Sydney, aged 44, midway through 67 as captain coach and played for another 3 seasons. Won at least 3 club best and fairest. Represented NSW on five occasions. Life member of AFL (NSW/ACT)
Syd C Felstead	1967	NSW Australian Football Association	Official	Born in 1919, Syd's involvement in Sydney football began in 1938 when he arrived at St George AFC where he went on to play 128 senior games. However his most significant contribution to Australian Rules Football was off the field with St George. At St George Syd was Club president for an amazing 20 year period from 1955 to 1974. His contribution to the development of local junior Aussie Rules cannot be underestimated and he was instrumental in the acquisition of Olds Park as an AFL venue, the ground which the Dragons still play at.
